The Canadian Biosolids and Residuals Conference was held this past May in Edmonton, and by all accounts was very successful. Over 100 people participated in the sessions and tradeshow. Feedback on the 30 sessions was positive. It started with a tour of the Edmonton Water Management Centre and ended with a group touring the AITF BioChar Facility in Vegreville. Keynote speaker Mike Van Ham with SYLVIS Environmental opened the conference with a presentation on '*Residuals as Resources: a glimpse through the looking glass*'.

## CANADIAN STOCKHOLM JUNIOR WATER PRIZE

Montreal in May brought excitement as the annual Canada Wide Science Fair (CWSF) brought the opportunity for students to nominate their projects for the Canadian Stockholm Junior Water Prize (CSJWP).

Each year the CSJWP National Organizing Committee, representing ACWWA, BCWWA, CWWA, Réseau Environnement, WCWEA, and WEAO, works through the Youth Science Foundation at the Canada Wide to select three student projects to compete for the privilege to represent Canada at the international Stockholm Junior Water Prize (SJWP) competition.

This premier event is held annually in late August in Stockholm, Sweden. The SJWP is the most prestigious international award for a water related science project at the high school level. This significant competition is held to encourage enthusiasm in today's youth for water issues, build an international community of young scientists bonded together for the water environment, raise public awareness about the future of our water resources and develop and ensure future leadership in the water community by attracting the best and the brightest young people to this field.

### 2016 Nominations

This year's slate of students truly represented the nation from east to west coast as the three students hailed from Newfoundland, Manitoba and British Columbia and covered a diverse range of work related to the water environment. Each student's project was evaluated against specific criteria by a slate of Member Association judges including Chief Judge Cindy Toth and panelists, Jeremy Kraemer, Klas Ohman and John Presta with reporter, Ian McIlwham.

The two runner-up projects included one by Meaghan MacKenzie who studied Eurasian watermilfoil, Myriophyllum spicatum, as a threat to the biodiversity of the Delta area's waterways in British Columbia testing a geotextile benthic barrier for eradication. The second runner-up project was from Manitoba's Philip Kawalec who focused on creating a sustainable water filter to extract iron and calcium from banana peels as the main filtering agent. Each runner-up receives a prize of \$300 and a certificate.

#### 2016 Canadian Winner

The CSJWP winner was Caitlyn Pratt from Newfoundland who studied oil spills, emergency response and the use of dispersants that affect wildlife. Dispersants impact the feather microstructure/mass of Thickbilled Murres (Uria Iomvia), a North Atlantic seabird and the bird's survival if its insulating feathers are compromised.

An oil spill environment was mimicked by exposing feathers to seawater and seawater with oil, oil with dispersant and dispersant and determining a feather amalgamation index. Results showed dispersants harmed feather waterproofing adding to the discussion of dispersant use, alternative mitigation tactics and changing dispersant use regulations.

Having lived on diverse coastlines around the world, Caitlyn has witnessed devastating effects of water pollution. Now living in Newfoundland, crystal water and magnificent coastlines exist unlike anything experienced in her travels. As a Grade 11 honour student at Holy Heart of Mary High School in St. John's, keen on swimming and diving, Caitlyn wants to protect the water she loves. She wants to pursue ways to guard these waters that comprise so much of our world and which brings her so much joy combined with her passion for science.

The culmination of Caitlyn's selection as Canada's representative is an all-expenses paid trip to Stockholm, Sweden in late August accompanied by our National Organizer representative Ian Mcilwham. Ian will be reporting back to us all later this year on the Caitlyn's experiences in her journey to Stockholm and we wish Caitlyn all the best as she strives to do her best for Canada at the competition.
